

Investigating Support for Teenage Mothers- A Pilot Study

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
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Abstract:

Despite its prevalence in low-income communities, teenage pregnancy affects all sectors of society. However, our society has a stigma against teenage pregnancy, which leaves many teenage mothers to endure it on their own. Therefore, this research will focus on finding resources to support teenage mothers through their pregnancy journey. As part of this study, survey questions will be administered to women who were teenage mothers once. In addition, interviews will be conducted afterward. Currently, there are no significant data available as the research study is still in preparation. However, this research will provide access to resources available to teenage mothers.

Literature Review:

• Teenage pregnancy is more likely to be a perpetuating cycle within a family.³



- Teenage pregnancy is causing an increase in domestic violence, substance use, mental health disorders, sexually transmissible infections (STIs), financial stress, and homelessness.¹
- Teenage mothers are more likely to have depression than adult mothers.²
 - Teenage mothers are more likely to abuse and neglect their kids.²
 - Their children are more likely to develop problems in intellectual development and psychosocial functioning.²
- A study found that 20% of 16-year-old participants were unaware of where to access mental health services.²
 - 11% of the participants stated that they were unable to afford the care.²

Method:

- Surveying Participants
 - Teenage Mothers (Currently or within the last 5 years)
 - Lived/Reside in Indiana
 - At least 18 years old

• Interview

• Interviewing participants via Zoom.

• Record and transcript the interview.

Pilot Study:

- The pilot study was conducted with three pilot participants and it include three surveys and two interviews.
 - Two of them were 20 years old and the third pilot participant was 18 years old.
 - Only two of the participants were interviewed as the third participant did not give consent.
- Survey:
 - All three of them completed 19 questions in under 20 minutes.
 - Survey topics discussed:
 - Healthcare Services
 - Their support system
 - Fundamental resources needed for their pregnancy
- Interview:
 - Discussed desired resources and support.
 - Shared personal experiences.
 - Offered advice to other teenage mothers.



"I shared it to my sister who was mainly just in disbelive and questioned whether the test was actually liable.Along with my sister I would say that her reaction did make me doubt the test and overall I was just disopointed in my self in general."

Participant 2: "I shared it to my close friend and she was super supportive about it."

Learning:
